Key Knowledge

<i>John the Baptist is a prophet who baptises people and tells them that someone greater than he is coming (Jesus).</i>	<i>John the Baptist calls people back to God by encouraging them to say sorry.</i>
<i>When Jesus was baptized, the Holy spirit came down from heaven and a voice said, 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.'</i>	<i>When people make bad choices (sin), they turn away from God.</i>
<i>Jesus was tempted in the wilderness, but he said 'No' and didn't turn his back on God.</i>	<i>Jesus teaches that God loves and forgives and that being sorry helps us to change and become better people.</i>
<i>Jesus' miracles are signs that show he is the promised one (Messiah).</i>	<i>Jesus used parables to teach people about God. An example is the Parable of the Lost Sheep.</i>
<i>Jesus brings healing in different ways.</i>	<i>Water is used as a symbol of a new start in the Sacrament of Baptism.</i>
<i>Baptism is a sign of forgiveness.</i>	<i>Catholics say sorry to God in prayers, for example, in the Act of Sorrow (Contrition).</i>
<i>It is important to say sorry to God and to others.</i>	<i>Acts of Penance are ways you can show you are sorry.</i>
